

After helping serve several plates of pesto pasta, the Dalai Lama spoke about creating a home, being at home, feeling at home and shared that "You know, I'm homeless, too." He spoke about learning hospitality from his mother, who although poor, always welcomed friends, relatives, beggars and all who were less fortunate and fed them whatever she had in her kitchen. "I'm really happy for the opportunity to visit," he said. "Our lives depend on others. Me too. My life depends on others. You are still in human society, human community. Please feel happy and feel dignity."


Inspired by Francis of Assisi



Our community was founded in England in 1905 and its first ministry was to the sick and the dying in the local parish, and to dock workers and their families. From the beginning, the community shared in the stresses and strains of the life of the poor, being continually faced with the challenge to live the Gospel in a particular time and place.


The Sisters came to the U.S. in 1974 and for thirty-five years, we have engaged in many types of ministry, but with special concern for the poor, the marginalized and the sick. We can be found in hospitals and nursing homes; among the homeless and those suffering from addictions; people with AIDS; teaching deacons and serving on diocesan commissions; providing spiritual direction and directing retreats. In all things we strive to be instruments of God's love after the example of Francis of Assisi.





Through the vows of poverty, chastity, and obedience, we form a community which provides us with support in our life of prayer, study and work, and also creates a concrete context for the daily living out of our ideals as we strive through God's grace to love despite imperfections and failings. We live together in an ordinary city house and go out into the surrounding neighborhoods to minister. We share the work of house and garden. In everything we do, we recall Francis' openness to all of creation as brother and sister, as we live our life together in simplicity and joy.

For over 800 vears Franciscans have been known for their active service to the poor, and certainly the needs which cry to us are very compelling. However, for us, as for St. Francis, this active service in the world begins and ends in prayer. We seek to deepen our relationship with God through a dialogue between the active life of preaching and serving and the life of prayer. This dialogue is aided by our round of daily offices, Eucharist, and times of corporate and private prayer.

Explore vowed membership

Entrance into religious life is a gradual process of mutual discernment between the aspirant and the community. An aspirant must be at least 21 years old, in good health and free from family, marital, and financial obligations. Women interested in exploring a Franciscan vocation are encouraged to write and to visit in order to get to know the sisters. In addition to individual visits, inquirers are invited to participate in "Consider Your Call," a week of discernment offered each summer. Aspirants who are accepted enter the community as postulants. After a postulancy of from three to 12 months, they become novices. novitiate is normally three years, after which novices make First Profession of vows. Life Profession may come after a further three years. And this is just the beginning of a lifetime of contemplative action and continuous discernment of God's will in a sister's life in community.



Associates are men and women from all walks of life who wish to share the mission and witness of the Society of St. Francis. Associates develop and follow a Rule of Life. They seek to exemplify the Franciscan values of humility, love and joy as they work to break down all barriers that segregate the human family and work to reflect that openness to all which was characteristic of Francis.
